EPA is interested in a wide range of stakeholders: watershed groups, homebuilders, agricultural, businesses, consultants, and any others who have an interest or will be affected by the outcome.

Outreach activities regarding the new regulations for Water of the United States (WOTUS) were delayed due to the federal government's shutdown. The public hearing was originally scheduled for January 24 in Kansas City, Kansas will now be held February 27 and 28. The national webinar is proposed for February 13. The Federal Register notice did not publish because their office was also closed during the shutdown. When it is published, there will be a 60-day public comment period.
