Parks, Soil & Water Sales Tax Working for You!

The Soil & Water Conservation Program works to conserve Missouri's soil and water for future generations, while the Missouri State Park System has a nearly 100-year-old tradition of preserving and interpreting the state's most outstanding natural landscapes and cultural features while providing recreational opportunities to the public. These two programs have been the beneficiaries of the One-Tenth of One Percent Parks, Soil & Water Sales Tax since it's inception in 1984 and it has been renewed by voters in 1988, 1996 and 2006. The tax is placed on the ballot every 10 years to reaffirm the voter's support of the park system and the soil & water conservation efforts. The Parks, Soils and Water Sales Tax is set to expire, if not renewed by voters in 2016. Each program shares one-half of the generated sales revenue and that portion comes to about \$7 a year per person. Missouri is the only state in the union that does not rely on general revenue to fund these programs. What do the programs do for you?

Soil & Water Conservation Program

In the 1930s, Americans realized how devastating soil erosion could be as the Dust Bowl swept across the nation, relocating an estimated 300 million tons of soil. In 1943, Missourians realized that they had the highest erosion rate in the nation, which led to the creation of the Soil and Water Conservation Districts. The District for Gasconade County was formed in 1964. Almost half of Missouri's cropland soil is classified as highly erodible. Revenues from the Parks, Soils and Water Sales Tax have resulted in Missouri having the greatest soil erosion reduction rate of any other state.

In 1982, Missouri's erosion rate was 10.9 tons per acre, the second highest in the nation. Currently, an average of 5.3 tons of soil erodes from each acre of Missouri's cultivated cropland each year. While the erosion rate has dropped by more than half, Missouri still has the fifth highest rate in the country.

There are 114 Soil & Water Conservation Districts in the state of Missouri.

- The Soil & Water Conservation Commission is governed by six landowners, which are appointed by the Governor. They develop statewide policies in accordance with the Statutes.
- District Grants are provided to each district to cover the costs of administrative and technical assistance that is provided to the local landowners, free of charge. Each district is governed by a board made up of four local agricultural landowners and one University Extension ex-officio member.
- Over \$660 million has been provided to Missouri agricultural landowners to implement more than 220,000 conservation practices through the Cost-share Program. With legislative changes in 2009, water quality practices are now available statewide to agricultural landowners in Missouri, in addition to the erosion control practices that have been in place for years.
- Research and Monitoring funding is also provided through the Soil and Water Conservation Program. These efforts identify new methods for soil & water conservation practices

- that produce the best results for preventing erosion and protecting water quality. Soil Health has become a major focus point for improving agricultural production as well as preserving our precious soil.
- The Districts are partnered with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) as they provide technical assistance and office facilities for most Districts.

Missouri State Parks

Missouri State Parks are committed to providing a high level of visitor services. Unlike most states, there are no entrance or dayuse fees in Missouri State Parks. The public can enter every state park and historic site at no charge. The tax allows staff to provide service directly to visitors by maintaining parks and historic sites, upgrading facilities or assisting guests.

New initiatives have focused on engaging youth in the wonder of the outdoors. In 2014 alone, nearly 55,000 interpretive programs were presented in state parks and historic sites. More than 18 million people visit the state park system each year and they consistently provide a 97% approval rating. The park system is ranked among the top four park systems in the country.

The state parks and historic sites contribute to a healthy economy. For every dollar spent by Missouri State Parks to operate the state park system, Missouri's economy sees a \$26 return on investment.

Scientific evidence suggests that parks and recreation are improving the health of communities and citizens. Missouri State Parks contribute to improving visitor's health and well-being, as well.

The consistent funding from the sales tax has allowed Missouri State Parks to maintain and upgrade the state park system to better serve the needs of visitors and protect resources. This includes repairing, renovating and maintaining buildings, restrooms, shelter houses and cabins, while also stabilizing and protecting historic structures.

In order to provide more opportunities for the public to experience nature and explore history, the funding helps support the development of new state parks and historic sites.

Missouri State Parks is committed to providing a high level of visitor services. To accomplish this goal, there must be enough staff to provide clean and safe facilities; enough interpreters to present the significance of each of the parks and sites; enough law enforcement personnel to ensure visitor safety; and enough general staff to provide adequate service to the public.

We hope that you will take advantage of the services that are provided through the Parks, Soil & Water Sales Tax and consider renewing your support for this vital program.

New Cost-share Practices for FY17

The **Animal Waste Management** concern's purpose is to manage waste from agricultural production in a manner that prevents or minimizes degradation of soil and water resources. Manure holding facilities as well as feeding and travel areas are covered. There are no erosion requirements for this practice. A Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plan (CNMP) must be developed prior to a cost-share application for any of these facilities, as well as, following Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) standards and specifications. Our county will address beef, dairy, or swine facilities and is limited to \$50,000 per landowner.

The **Nutrient/Pest Management** concern is back in Gasconade County. These are incentive payments and must follow a nutrient or pest management plan. Nutrient Management may receive up to \$20 per acre with a lifetime maximum of \$10,000 per landowner/operator and Pest Management may receive up to \$10 per acre with a \$5,000 per landowner/operator. All applications must be board approved between January 1 – April 15th of each year. Payments are completed after one growing season but not before October 31st of that year. Either the landowner or the operator may apply for this practice, whomever is incurring the expense.



FSA Updates



CROP REPORTING DEADLINES:

- 2016 spring-seeded grains and CRP must be reported by July 15, 2016
- 2017 hay and pasture acres must be reported by November 15, 2016
- 2017 Fall barley, wheat and other fall seeded small grains must be reported by December 15, 2016

Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) & Price Loss Coverage (PLC):

ARC/PLC is a financial safety net program that comes into effect when there are substantial
drops in crop prices or revenues. Annual contract signing for 2016 began on December 1, 2015,
and will continue until August 1, 2016. Producers who do not sign an annual contract will lose
possibility of a payment for that year. Call the FSA office to check on the status of your contract.

FARM STORAGE FACILITY LOAN PROGRAM (FSFL):

Eligible producers can obtain a low-interest loan for 7, 10 or 12 years to build or upgrade storage or handling facilities. This program includes grain bins and hay barns. January Interest Rate: 2.00% (Fixed for a 7 year term)

FARM LOAN PROGRAMS:

 Eligible farmers and ranchers may qualify for the low interest credit if they cannot get financing at a commercial lender. Loan can be obtained for annual operating expenses, for purchase or refinance of livestock and machinery, and for the purchase of real estate.

January Interest Rates:

Direct Farm Ownership-3.875% Direct Farm Operating-2.625%

Beginning Farmer Down Payment Farm Ownership-1.5%

MARKETING ASSISTANCE LOANS (MAL):

- MALs are available to producers after they have harvested their grain crop, and have it stored on the farm.
- Producers can use the loan proceeds to refrain from selling the grain crop until the market price is higher. TheLoan can be used to pay for current expenses, or to reduce cost of seed and fertilizer by purchasing it earlier.
- A lump sum is advanced to the producer in an amount equivalent to the value of the grain stored on the farm, or a lesser amount if the producer so chooses.

EMERGENCY FLOOD PROGRAMS

- ECP- Emergency Conservation Program- emergency funding for farmers to restore land damaged by natural disasters, which may include fence loss, gravel and sand deposits.
- ELAP- Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish- emergency relief for damaged or destroyed livestock feed purchased, or harvested, with the intention of using as feed for producers' eligible livestock. (Must submit a notice of loss within 30 days of the disaster.)
- LIP- Livestock Indemnity Program- payments for livestock death losses due to adverse weather. The losses must be in excess of the normal mortality rate.

NON-INSURED CROP DISASTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (NAP)

- Provides financial assistance to producers who produce agricultural commodities that are not covered through standard crop insurance agencies.
- Provides financial assistance when a natural disaster occurs and causes lower yields, crop losses, or completely prevents the planting of crops.
- Some crops that may be eligible include fruits and vegetables, mushrooms, floriculture, forage and grazing crops, aquaculture, ginseng, honey, syrup, and industrial crops.

CENTRAL REGION GRAZING SCHOOL DATES ANNOUNCED!

Due to the increased training requirements, the UME/NRCS Certified Grazing School has been extended from 2 to 2.5 days. Remember that this school is a requirement to receive State Cost-share for Grazing Management Practices and is consider ranking points when applying for Federal Cost-Share through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP).
