Fall Food Plot Establishment by Scott Roy, MDC



Did you find yourself scrambling this spring for a dry day or two to put in spring food plots? If it didn't happen, don't despair, you still have time to plant a quality fall food plot. A green browse plot of legumes with a thin stand of grass provides forage for turkeys, deer and rabbits and attracts an abundance of insects for turkey poults and quail.

Green browse plots should be a minimum of one acre with three to five acres being ideal. One plot per forty acres should be sufficient for deer and turkey. Plots should be located on level ridge tops, bottom lands, or along the contour of a gentle slope. The site should be open, tillable and adjacent to suitable escape cover. A strip at least fifty feet from any woodland edge will reduce competition from trees and allow sunlight to reach the planting. A buffer strip of perennial weeds and woody shrubs will develop over a period of time between the browse plot and the timber. There are specific program requirements for establishing food plots on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres. Please check with your local FSA office for guidelines or contact your local MDC, Private Land Conservationist.

Seed bed preparation will take place in September or early October. The ground should be plowed and disked until no live vegetation exists. If the sod is very dense spray the area with a grass herbicide. Always follow label recommendations when applying chemical. The plot should resemble a garden ready to be planted once tillage is complete. A well-prepared seed bed is critical for good seed to soil contact.

There are many commercial green browse mixes available that are excellent blends of clovers and forages. These come at a premium price though. If you are on a budget try this mix: seed 30 pounds of winter wheat and 2 pounds of orchard grass at the time of seed bed preparation. At the same time or through early March overseed the plot with 5 pounds of either inoculated Ladino clover, Red clover, Alsike clover, Korean Lespedeza, or a mixture of these. Here is a little secret. "Regal" Ladino clover is nearly the same as the highly publicized "White-tail Deer Clover", but costs considerably less! Regal produces a very lush stand of clover on soils with high fertility.

Fertilizer and lime should be applied and worked into the soil at the time of seed bed preparation. Correct fertilization is essential for successful establishment and maintenance of the browse plot. Obtain a soil sample for each plot site and take them to

the University Extension Center for analysis. The results will show what fertilizer should be added.

If soil test recommendations cannot be obtained in time for planting, the following recommendations for a starter application should be sufficient. Apply 500 lb. of 6-12-12 fertilizer per acre at the time of seed bed preparation. This amount may be sufficient for three to four years at which time a fertilizer top-dressing may be required.

Ag lime can be applied at the rate of three to four tons per acre. A soil test will indicate the need for additional lime if the soil pH needs to be regulated. Ag lime should be applied 3 – 6 months in advance. Incorporating the lime into the soil will provide quicker absorption. Pelleted lime may be substituted for ag lime at a rate of one to two tons per acre due to a higher ENM value (effective neutralizing material). This can mixed in the cart with the rest of the fertilizer. To keep your plots healthy some annual maintenance is required. Mow the plots each year between July 1 and July 15, using either a rotary or sickle mower. After three or four years, if the grasses or weeds have crowded out the legumes, renovate the plot and re-seed it.

Having a balance of green browse plots and grain plots ensures maximum wildlife benefit. As a rule of thumb if your farm is surrounded by crop fields you will want to plant more green browse plots than grain plots. Remember, the intent of a food plot is a supplemental feeding source for wildlife to get them through the winter, not to keep them fat year round. Important seeding information for the 4th quarter of 2011:

The last acceptable date for the seeding of cool season grasses is October 15th with a no-plant period from October 16th through November 30th. Dormant season planting of cool season grasses may resume for the period of December 1st through March 15th. The acceptable dormant planting season for warm season grasses is November 16th through March 15th.

Cost-Share sign up:

The Grundy County SWCD maintains a 12 month open and continuous sign up for conservation practice cost-share funds. Pumpkin Pillow

Supplies: newspaper; scissors;1 yard orange, 1/4 yard black, and 1/8 yard green polar fleece or felt; permanent marker; fabric glue; and fiberfill.

1. Begin by drawing a pumpkin shape on newspaper. Make pumpkin large, as it will seem smaller after stuffing.

2. With the help of an adult cut out pumpkin.

3. Place it over orange fabric and trace around it with permanent marker. Repeat this step to get two matching pieces of fabric.

4. Cut out 2 pieces; place one directly on top of other, marked sides together.

Puppy Chow

6 cups Crispix cereal 1/2 cups peanut butter 1/2 cups butter 1/2 cup chocolate chips 2 cups powdered sugar

Melt peanut butter, butter, and the chocolate chips together in the microwave or on the stove. Melt until the 3 ingredients are smooth. After the melting, put the cereal in a large bowl, and pour the mixture on top of the cereal. 5. Apply thin layer of fabric glue, a few inches at a time, 1/4 inch from edge to seal edges. Leave 4-inch section at top unglued so you can stuff it. Let glue set overnight.

6. Stuff pillow with fiberfill and then glue opening closed.

7. To add a stem, cut it out of green fleece and place it between 2 pieces of orange paper before gluing them closed.

8. If you want to give your pumpkin eyes, a nose, and a mouth, cut them out of black fleece and glue them to the stuffed pillow.
