Discover Nature with MDC through Women's Outdoor-Skills Workshop

June 1-3 workshops will teach hands-on outdoor skills. Registration deadline is April 30.

JEFFERSON CITY Mo -- The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) invites women to get hands-on training in various outdoor skills at its "Discover Nature Women Summer Workshop" June 1-3 at the Windermere Conference Center along the Lake of the Ozarks in Roach, Mo.

The workshop provides a safe and friendly environment where women receive hands-on outdoor-skills training at the beginner level by selecting a group of four courses from the following offerings: archery, hunting, canoeing, outdoor cooking, firearms, camping, fishing, fly tying, map and compass reading, and shotgun shooting. Women attending for the first time are encouraged to attend the program a second year to complete four additional courses.

The special weekend is targeted to women 18 years and older, along with young women age 14-17 when accompanied by a woman 18 years or older. The workshop is free, but a \$20 deposit is required at the time of registration and will be refunded at check in. There is no deposit fee for young women aged 14–17 when registered with an adult. Registration deadline is April 30.

Participants are responsible for their own accommodations and meals. MDC will provide dinner on Saturday. MRBI – Matt Miller, SWAT Technician

We want to thank everybody who has signed up for the MRBI assistance as for the sign-up for this years ranking has ended. For all interested landowners awareness, you may still sign up for MRBI assistance at any time for future ranking. The next deadline on our schedule is March 30th and our ranking must be completed. Then by April 6th all pre-approvals will be made and the contract obligation deadline will be April 27th. Some of the practices that are cost shared on in the MRBI are: terraces, underground outlets, sediment basins and nitrate testing. There are more practices on the list and if you are interested on a different practice just give us a call and we will see if the MRBI program is suitable for your needs.

If you are unaware, we have limited MRBI funds in Grundy County but we also have other options that might be an alternative choice for your farm. First is EQIP and EQIP is a vast program with options for just about every landowner. This program is competitive but it never hurts to sign up because you are not obligated to anything until you sign an approved contract. You may sign up for EQIP at any given time of year and any one person here at the office can help you with your application process. Our other option is State Cost Share. With the state cost share you can sign up throughout the year and put on the list. As our funds are limited, and we don't know how much money we get from year to year, the wait on the list may be extensive. The upside is that once you're on the list you only have to play the waiting game. State Cost Share is not competitive and if your site is approved for a practice and the money is available and if your name is on the top of the list then you will receive 75% cost share on your desired practice.

Tech Notes by Kevin Stover

Seeding Dates:

There are important dates to keep in mind as landowners look to planned seeding of grasses and legumes in the second quarter of 2012. The chart below lists the "optimal" and "acceptable" dates for both Cool and Warm Season Grasses.

Cool Season Grasses:

Optimal: March 16 – April 30 *Acceptable*: March 16 – May 31

Warm Season Grasses and Legumes:

Optimal: April 16 – June 15 *Acceptable*: March 16 – June 30

Cost-Share Applications:

For the final quarter of fiscal year 2012 and for the full life of fiscal year 2013 the maximum amount of cost share for any practice in the Sheet/Rill and Gully areas of concern is limited to \$10,000 of total cost-share. In addition, a landowner may be listed on the District Cost-Share list twice but may only have one practice per fiscal year.

FY '12 Important Cost-Share Contract Updates

As fiscal year 2012 comes to a close for the Grundy County Soil and Water Conservation District on June 30th of this year, it is important to remember that if you are a cooperator with a cost-share contract dated between the dates of July 1st, 2011 and May 31st, 2012, you must have all construction, seed, lime, and fertilizer receipts, paid contractor bills, needed direct deposit and banking information, contractor check out notes, and have your practice inspected and certified no later than June 1st, 2012. This policy is new for this year and will be the cut-off date for cost-share practice completion for future years as well. If you have a practice that you have discussed with District staff that is from "Advanced FY '13 Funding" the June 1st, 2012 date does not concern you cost-share contract.

Kids Corner – Fun Food Facts – History of the Cadbury Crème Egg

I am dedicating this article to my son, Derik Keith, Mechanical Engineering Student at the University of Missouri in Columbia. He has already been purchasing his Cadbury Crème Eggs!

Brand history: Crème Egg, a Cadbury milk chocolate egg containing a white and yellow fondant filling (known officially as goo), has been a firm favorite of the UK confectionery market for almost 40 years.

Since 1971, this product has been manufactured in Bournville, which is currently laying Crème Eggs at a rate of 1.5 million a day. This little treat is our best-selling confectionery item throughout the goo season, between New Year's Day and Easter Day. Despite the limited sales period, annual sales are in excess of 200 million eggs, with a further 100 million exported around the globe.

The manufacturing process is quite unique; first, the molten chocolate is poured into the molds, which is then filled with white fondant. The relative density of the two ingredients causes the chocolate to push outwards to fully coat the mold. Finally, the yellow goo is carefully inserted in the middle before the two halves of the mold are snapped together to create a perfect egg, cooled and wrapped.

In 1985, the familiar 'How do you eat yours?' campaign began inviting people to think about how they eat their eggs.

For those Crème Egg fans who need their fix of 'goo' all year round, in 2008 we created the Cadbury Creme Egg Twisted bar.

Did you know...

A great deal of research has gone into understanding the Crème Egg consumer. Our findings show that 53% of people will bite off the top, lick out the goo and then eat the chocolate and 20% of people will just bite straight through, whilst 16% of people use their finger to scoop out the crème.

Despite its diminutive size, Crème Egg is a giant of the UK Easter market. It is the most popular chocolate single in unit sales between January and Easter, outselling its closest rival by 2 to 1.

Kids Corner – RecipeFOUR-CHEESE SCALLOPED POTATOES

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into pieces, plus more for brushing
- 1/2 clove garlic
- 1/3 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/3 cup shredded asiago cheese
- 1/3 cup shredded raclette or comte cheese
- 2 pounds russet potatoes, peeled and sliced 1/8 inch thick
- Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg
- 4 fresh bay leaves
- 1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese

Directions

Position a rack in the upper third of the oven and preheat to 425 degrees F. Generously brush a large skillet with butter, then rub with the garlic. Combine the mozzarella, asiago and raclette in a bowl.

Heat the skillet over medium-high heat. Add half of the potatoes, spreading them out. Sprinkle with 3/4 teaspoon salt, half of the cut-up butter, half of the shredded cheese blend, and pepper to taste. Arrange the remaining potatoes on top. Sprinkle with 3/4 teaspoon salt, and pepper to taste. Pour the cream over the potatoes, then add the nutmeg and bay leaves; simmer 3 minutes. Dot the potatoes with the remaining cut-up butter.

Generously brush a shallow baking dish with butter; slide the potatoes into the dish; arrange with a fork, if desired. (If your skillet is ovenproof, you can skip this step and bake the potatoes in the skillet.)

Sprinkle the potatoes with the parmesan and the remaining shredded cheese blend. Bake until golden, about 25 minutes. Let rest 5 minutes before serving. Discard the bay leaves.
